Delaware

Delaware's Quaint Villages

Visit the Johnson Victrola Museum, in Delaware's Quaint Villages and discover the history of recorded sound. This museum pays tribute to Delawarean Eldridge R. Johnson, founder of the Victor Talking Machine Company in 1901. The Museum documents his success as a pioneer, inventor and successful business man during the 20th Century. Maryland

Annapolis & Anne Arundel County

Annapolis was our nation's first peacetime capital, Maryland's first incorporated city, home of the first parochial libraries and the colony's first newspaper, the Maryland Gazette, which still publishes. Maryland's State House is the oldest state capitol in continuous legislative use. Baltimore

Baltimore was the first city in the U.S. to illuminate its streets with gas-powered lamps. Calvert County

Arthur Storer, known as the first Colonial American astronomer, was among the first to observe and record data describing Halley's Comet in Calvert County in the 1600s. Caroline County

Taking an early stand on slavery, Preston residents operated at least three Underground Railroad stations before the Civil War, including one run by Harriet Tubman's parents. An elderly Barbara Fritchie waved her union flag out the window of her Frederick home as Confederate troops passed on the street below, inspiring the popular poem "The Ballad of Barbara Fritchie". Hagerstown - Washington County

Major Jonathan Letterman, Army of the Potomac medical director, instituted a new era of medical command and control during the Battle of Antietam that is still used today. Butler is the birthplace of the Jeep. The county celebrates this through the annual Bantam Jeep Heritage Festival in June. Thousands of visitors attend this event to embrace the vehicle's past

Central Pennsylvania

Bellefonte is the birthplace of seven Pennsylvania governors, but perhaps none more famous than Andrew Gregg Curtin. Chester County

Wharton Esherick has been called the first link between the Arts and Crafts Movement and the resurgent interest in furniture making. Endless Mountains

The Dennis Farm in Susquehanna County is the first continuously-documented property owned by African Americans in a largely white county in the US northeast. Franklin County

Chambersburg was home to inventor Joseph Winters. Winters worked on the Cumberland Valley Railroad. He also invented the fire escape and fire alarm in 1876, the first aerial escape ladder in 1877, and the hose conductor in 1882. Hershey Harrisburg

In 1900, Milton S. Hershey became the first person in the U.S. to mass-produce milk chocolate. Huntingdon County

Huntingdon is the hometown of Tom Hoover the "Father of the Hemi" engine that changed NASCAR forever and powered generations of muscle cars. J.C. Blair invented the paper writing tablet in Huntingdon. Lancaster County

Founded in 1861, the Julius Sturgis Pretzel Bakery in Lititz is the first commercial pretzel bakery in America. Visitors can still tour the original bakery, get a hands-on lesson in pretzel twisting,

Laurel Highlands

In 1904, Dr. David Strickler of Tassel Pharmacy in Latrobe, invented his banana-based sundae at the pharmacy's soda fountain. William Luden, a young candymaker, created cough drops in his mother's kitchen in Reading, providing an alternative to cumbersome vials of menthol. Luden then gave railroad workers his invention. Through their travels, Luden's Cough Drops became known coast to coast.

Pocono Mountains

In 1946, the Poconos opened Big Boulder Ski Area, the first commercial ski area in Pennsylvania. The Pennsylvania Lumber Museum along Route 6 is home to the Shay Locomotive, a gear-driven engine used to transport goods of the state's lumber industry.
